

Meeting William Faulkner: How an English Schoolboy found a Literary Lion

The black tie event for this year was held at The Georgian Club with 27 in attendance. Our guest speaker for the evening, retired English teacher and former ESU Exchange Student, Simon Claxton (*pictured left with Jean Morris*), regaled us with his account of an interview with famous author, William Faulkner. To satisfy a senior year project requirement, he bravely wrote to Faulkner requesting permission to interview him at his home in Oxford, Mississippi. Even though the author claimed to have never

received the letter, when Mr. Claxton arrived at his home, Faulkner welcomed him even though Faulkner hated to be interviewed and didn't particularly like strangers! Claxton proceeded to ask several questions about his life, method of writing and story-telling style receiving very matter-of-fact answers. As it turned out, this interview by the high school student was one of the last Faulkner did as he died four months later on July 6, 1962.

The newly-renovated Stuart A. Rose Manuscript Archives and Rare Books Library at Emory University houses an amazing selection of reading and research material and is well worth a visit at any time. The impressive facility was the perfect venue for this meeting.



First off, our BUSS scholar, Gary Hicks (pictured left chatting with ESU Chairman of the BUSS Committee, Charles Maddrey), shared a slide presentation of his experiences while he was in London at the Globe Theatre this past summer. He was very enthusiastic about what he learned and said he came away invigorated and inspired by his personal experiences while attending workshops and even doing a play at the Globe. Annual General Meeting October 10 - 12, 2015

President Morris attends National Annual General Meeting in New York

Jean represented the Atlanta Branch at the National Annual General Meeting, October 10-12, 2015, at the Metropolitan Doubletree Hotel in New York City. The Presidents' Conclave was held all of Saturday afternoon with welcome speeches from the new National Chairman of the ESUUS, Dr. Paul Beresford-Hill, MBE, and Chris Broadwell, Executive Director (pictured right with our President).

She was informed by Josh Keppel-Gonzalez, Branch Communications Coordinator, of the importance of moving more and more to the use of technology

and putting all information about the ESU Programs on websites for easy access.



Carol Losos, Director of Education, described the expanding Educational Outreach and her contacts with 8,000 English teachers through professional organizations. She is working with all things Shakespeare 400: a new logo, Shakespeare teacher workshops, the BUSS Scholarship program, English in Action, the essay, debate and public speaking projects. She recognized the Atlanta Branch and awarded us a Shakespeare T-Shirt as a result of our participation in the BUSS Scholarship program. Overall her work has provided a 25% increase in participation in the ESU educational programs. You may want to read the information in the Annual Report, 2015, which you should have received.

Jeff Schnabel, Chairman of the Branch Services Committee, reported that the committee has approved the **Board Managed Operations Agreement** after several years of working with lawyers and specialists. The agreement will require the formation of LLC's which protects us legally as individuals and puts the 501(c)3 organization more in line with the IRS requirements. The Board has been sent the documents for our understanding, and we will be working to utilize all our legal knowledge to understand and approve of this document which will indeed change the bylaws and the general structure of the ESUUS and the Branch organizations.

In the evening, the Patrons' Party was held at the Morris-Jumel Mansion (*pictured left*) on the northernmost end of Manhattan and for a time the Revolutionary War Headquarters of George Washington and later home of Aaron Burr, who married into the Morris-Jumel family. On Monday morning, the attendees enjoyed a breakfast at the ESU Headquarters on 39th Street and a trip by bus to the southern end of Manhattan to Federal Hall, where George Washington was inaugurated as our first President.

Although the National AGM is open to all members, the meeting is a very important experience for the Branch President.

Dr. Paul Beresford-Hill Elected Chairman of The English-Speaking Union of the United States



Dr. Paul Beresford-Hill MBE was elected Chairman of The English-Speaking Union of the United States unanimously at a meeting of its Board of Directors on September 27. His two-year term of office began immediately. Dr. Beresford-Hill was selected to lead the

English-Speaking Union of the United States for his global experience as a scholar, educator, administrator and author.

Paul Beresford-Hill is a distinguished educator who has worked at the secondary and tertiary educational systems of the US and the UK. A graduate of both Oxford University and Columbia, he has been a Research Associate at the Oxford Department of Educational Studies, Senior Member of Wadham College, Oxford, and an Adjunct Professor at Columbia University Teacher's College. He has worked in the USA, the UK and Asia, and was Chief Administrator for Global Learning at Dowling College in Long Island. From 1999 to 2004 he was Director of Bangkok Patana School, the British International School in Thailand, one of the largest international schools in Asia.

Dr. Beresford-Hill assumed the Chairmanship of the English-Speaking Union upon the resignation of educator and historian Josiah Bunting III, who had served as Chair of the ESU since 2013.
