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

President's Message

Leaping into February



If nothing else, 2024 promises to be an unusually interesting twelve months. This leap year will see the Olympics, a total solar eclipse, and what may be the most consequential presidential election of our lifetime. Before all that, however, on February 14 Ash Wednesday and Valentine's Day will share the same date for the first time since 1945. As a way of celebrating this convergence of Cupid and Christianity, why not experience the romance of visiting some of Florida's most striking churches?

We can begin with a pair of the state's most beautiful chapels right here in Winter Park which share a curious historic connection. Built in 1932, the Knowles Memorial Chapel was designed to fit the college's Mediterranean Revival style by America's most famous ecclesiastical architect, Ralph Adams Cram, who also designed New York's Cathedral Church of St. John the Divine. (Despite multiple chapels and churches, Cram said Knowles was his favorite.) The chapel's bell is the same one which called students to the college's first classes in 1885, and the wonderful Rose Window features Sophia or Wisdom, one of the few feminine representations of God in the Bible, surrounded by the seven liberal arts.

Less imposing but equally remarkable is the exquisite Tiffany Chapel interior at the Morse Museum. First shown at the World's Columbian Exhibition in Chicago in 1893, the site of Eric Larson's excellent book *The Devil in the White City*, the chapel was installed in Ralph Adams Cram's Cathedral Church of St. John Divine in New York. When Tiffany glass went out of fashion and St. John's did not want the chapel any more, Tiffany moved it to his home at Laurelton Hall on Long Island. After a major fire at Laurelton, Hugh and Jeannette McKean bought it and a massive number of other Tiffany works for the museum Jeannette had founded and named after her grandfather, Charles Hosmer Morse.

Appropriately sited on Church Street in Orlando, the Chapel at the Towers on the eighteenth floor of Lutheran Towers soars magnificently above the City Beautiful. Its organ is even more elaborate than the one at Rollins and you can enjoy a visit and the view at the free—something all ESU members love—monthly concerts organized by my friend Myra Winkler, which feature everything from the Bach choir and Orlando Philharmonic to Carol Stein and the Orlando Ballet.

A short drive to Lakeland will take the modernists and post-modernists among us to Frank Lloyd Wright's Annie Pfeiffer Chapel at Florida Southern College. Instead of a steeple, this iconoclastic 1941 Prairie Style celebration of horizontal geometry, concrete, and repetitive patterns features a curious wire structure at its peak, a design students call God's Bicycle Rack. Wright's Chapel is the gem of a beautiful campus which includes the largest single site collection of Wright buildings.

If you are curious about the recent fascination with Florida's Carpenter Gothic Episcopal Churches, we have three excellent examples in Orange Country: All Saints in Enterprise, Christ Church in Longwood, and the Church of the Holy Spirit in Longwood. You can learn far more about these remarkable nineteenth-century buildings from our ESU colleague Phil Eschbach and the Florida Historical Society's "Florida Frontiers TV Episode 54" on YouTube.

When you are in the mood for a serious road trip, here are two other churches worth visiting. Florida's most interesting church is, oddly enough, a 12th Century Spanish Cistercian monastery named after the French abbot who co-founded the Knights Templar, St. Bernard de Clairvaux. William Randolph Hearst bought it in 1926, had it disassembled and shipped to New York, intending to add it to San Simeon (i.e., Citizen Kane's Xanadu). It remained in Brooklyn until two Floridians bought it, brought it to North Miami, and had it reassembled. Eventually it became an Episcopalian Church.

In Collier County, about 36 miles from Naples, is the planned community of Ave Maria built on streets that radiate out from the Ave Maria Oratory, one of our country's most interesting examples of twenty-first century ecclesiastical architecture. As part of a plan by Tom Monaghan, the founder of Domino's Pizza, to carve out of the Everglades a modern conservative Catholic enclave, the stunning stone, glass, and steel church, set on a plinth to raise it above surrounding buildings, soars 120 feet to evoke the sense of a European cathedral.

And to expand your sense of the ways physical structures can manifest the eternal, you can add to your list three other beautiful and fascinating religious spaces: The Boca Raton Synagogue; the Assalam Center Mosque, also in Boca Raton; and the Hindu Temple of Florida in Tampa.


Branch Winter Dinner continued...

The Gatsby's Oxford
Americans in the City of Dreaming Spires
1904 - 1929



F.Scott Fitzgerald had been dreaming of Oxford long before he wrote his greatest novel, *The Great Gatsby*, in 1924. Oxford and the medieval aesthetic can be seen throughout his writings, Dr. Snyder will highlight some examples of this as well as the experiences of Americans from the first Rhodes Scholars to T.S. Eliot and other famous writers—J.R.R. Tolkien, C.S. Lewis, Evelyn Waugh, chasing the spirit of the Middle Ages down Oxford's cobbled lanes.

Christopher A. Snyder, Ph.D., is a Faculty Fellow, Professor of History, and Director of British Studies at Mississippi State University. Senior Academic Visitor, Oriel College, University of Oxford (2023)
