On the Wings of Angels

The British monarchy and its concept of a privileged ruling class draws staunch supporters, harsh critics and simply apathetic observers. Privilege is defined by the idea of inheriting wealth and position, rather than working to earn it. That is why 1776 happened, but let us leave that discussion alone for now. Instead let us define *constancy* and how it can profoundly influence both nations and individuals.

I keep hearing that word *constancy* associated with Queen Elizabeth II. Seven decades of anything might fit a narrow definition of ever-present, but seventy years of service with an example of honesty, integrity and caring creates a bedrock upon which a nation and its people can thrive. It is what I call *admirable constancy*. Think of the opposite: *insufferable constancy*. Thankfully Queen Elizabeth II was intelligent, benevolent and of high moral character. Her longevity could have led to much suffering and instability if she had not been. Indeed we have enough of those examples throughout history and even today.



Thank you to Queen Elizabeth for granting a royal charter to the English-Speaking Union of the Commonwealth in 1957. The close ties between ESUC and ESUUS continue to strengthen both organizations in our common pursuit of Sir Wrench's ideals. The Queen spoke at ESUUS in New York in 1957 and graciously in 1976 to help us celebrate the bicentennial of our break with England.

Queen Elizabeth II has been a constant and beloved presence in the lives of everyone over the age of about ten in the UK and the Commonwealth countries, even those who would prefer to separate politically from the crown. For that matter, she is admired and revered around the world, not just because she is Her Majesty the Queen, but because she is Elizabeth the Grand Lady.

It is a fact that the British iron-willed determination to keep Hitler out of England started with the constancy of Princess Elizabeth and her family. Walking among the ruins of bombed-out London, they provided the hope and courage to survive, while Churchill and the military-political machine provided the iron will and determination to achieve victory. The braiding of these two strands created an impenetrable fortress that Hitler could not defeat with mere brutality. Today we are witnessing another madman unable to batter through the hope and faith of the Ukrainian people, led by the constancy of a courageous, steady leader. The parallels are stunning.

When Elizabeth became queen a few years later, her people already respected and loved her - not because she was owed fealty as the monarch, but because she had stayed with them through the worst. She remained steady during the longest reign in history, never subjugating fervent love of her country and its people below personal glory or power. No matter what boiled in the world around her - and there was plenty, much of it personal - she did not crumble, even if there were a misstep here and there. She was their Mother - to be counted on to be the same every day of their lives, even when nothing else was. Even when the ground was shifting under their feet. Even when there was more senseless hatred. Even when dictators, demagogues and authoritarians reemerged as populist favorites. The world as they had always known it was still there, with Mother England cradling them in her love and constancy. Our hearts go out to them in the void undoubtedly created in her passing.

So who is left to be an example of strength, hope and *constancy*? We are. Person to person. We all have an opportunity - an obligation - to treat others with kindness and dignity. We do not have to leave it to powerful people to effect change. So-called "Powerful" people come with an agenda, very often a self-serving one. We are all powerful, able to make a difference, able to effect change, able to drown out the angry voices. We too can to be an example of *constancy*. If not us, then who? There will likely never be another Queen Elizabeth II.

Overlay this concept of the *humanity of man* with our founder Sir Evelyn Wrench's English-Speaking Union vision in 1918: people-to-people discourse using the power of the English language is the way civilized people should settle all disputes, be they interpersonal or international.

Kindness is not weakness. It has power and *constancy*.

2022 ab Scholars' Reports and Reunion

Forty former Drey Scholars with invited colleagues and members of the ESU Board gathered to enjoy our returning Drey Scholars' around-the-table discussion of their experiences this summer in the United Kingdom. Scholar Chair, Reta Jackson, introduced Lizzy Brannan and Matthew Nash-Brown, who travelled to London to participate in "Teaching Shakespeare Through Performance" and Jessica Furiosi and Gerry Precil, who both attended Oxford University's program on "History, Politics and Society," and last but not least, Kris Kahn, who travelled to Edinburgh, Scotland, to attend classes in Contemporary Scottish Drama as well as plays at the International Fringe Festival. These scholars were chosen back in 2019 and have the distinction of being named Drey Scholars for four years due to the pandemic.



Gerry Precil began the discussion by asking everyone to explain what classes they chose for their program followed by what a typical day was like and their most memorable moment. Jessica and Gerry took classes about Immigration and Modern Warfare. Gerry was proud that her paper in the Modern Warfare class received a grade one point from Writing with Distinction. Jessica shared that she chose the Modern Warfare Class because she knew nothing about the subject and wanted to gain that knowledge/background.

Lizzy and Matthew had the experience of hearing their voices projected from the stage at the Globe as they read lines from Shakespeare. They kept the audience laughing, especially when Jessica explained she was Juliet in the play and Matthew was her Nurse. They enthusiastically talked about all the craziness of being students instead of teachers and the insights this gave them.

Kris Kahn shared some of his adventures when he spent eleven days before classes began by renting a motorcycle and touring the Scottish Highlands and Isle of Skye to become closely acquainted with Scottish culture. His memorable moment was scary since his passport was stolen, but he had taken a picture of it on his phone. He shared in a most entertaining way how the American Embassy helped by giving him a temporary passport.

All of the scholars talked about the culture shock of being in the United Kingdom. One example was how advanced they are technologically. To buy even an ice cream at Stonehenge, Jessica discovered no cash was accepted; just tap your credit/debit card on the square. It seems the U.K. has moved to being a cashless society.

The program in the University Club Library ended by answering questions from the audience and everyone giving these educators a big round of applause. The Reunion commenced in the adjoining room where tables of sandwiches, fruits, vegetables and cookies were enjoyed, as well as lots of laughter and conversations.

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
