I hope to see the Denver chapter gain more of a presence in social media, and attract more members through an expansion of its Denver events.

Twenty of us were lucky to see Lenne Klingaman play a female Hamlet at the Colorado Shakespeare Festival in Boulder in August - she played the Prince with enlightening attitude. At the start of November, expect to hear details about our annual dinner featuring the recipients of this year's scholarships for Teachers Learning Abroad in the United Kingdom. Students will again have a chance to submit a written piece to be judged by board members and teachers in our annual Dr. Howard F. Beckley Writing Competition - the finalists typically read their pieces at our annual holiday party in December. The board of directors will continue to program events that people enjoy and see as relevant to the purpose of the organization. We welcome your ideas and participation in the Denver ESU. Thank you for the opportunity to serve in light of Education, Scholarship, and Understanding.



#### In Memorium



Longtime English-Speaking Union member and friend, Randy Mack Wren, passed away suddenly on July 10, 2017. A Colorado native, Randy was born in Denver's Porter Hospital on June 11, 1951 to John E. Wren and Martha Jane (Edwards) Wren. Randy grew up in southeast Denver, graduating from Cherry Creek High School in 1969. He attended Chapman College in California where he participated in World Campus Afloat, sparking a life-long passion for travel. Randy had recently traveled to China and had a trip planned for Russia.

After working for Frontier Bank, Manna Foods, and a wholesale business he helped launch, Randy moved to New York City where he studied with Lee Strasberg, appeared in Off-Broadway productions, and was featured in television and magazine ads. Randy returned to Denver to help his mother when his father was diagnosed with cancer.

In addition to the ESU, Randy was a member of the Denver Advertising Federation, the Denver Dinosaurs, the Denver Press Club, the Colorado Symphony Guild, and St. Andrews Episcopal Church. He was the founder of the Grove Project, the Hallelujah Ball (a benefit for St. John's Hospice) and a cable television program called *Randy Wren Live*. A supporter of many causes, Randy was frequently busy volunteering for various organizations and friends.

Randy is survived by his brothers, Jay Wren of Castle Rock and John Wren of Denver in addition to many nieces, nephews, cousins and close friends. He will be greatly missed.
