Christopher Broadwell, Executive Director, served as the ESU's Deputy Director from 2007 to 2014 and brings to this post wide-ranging experience in administration, development, marketing, special events, public relations, and promotion. Mr. Broadwell began his career at the ESU as Branch Services Administrator and subsequently worked in both the nonprofit and for-profit sectors. His past positions include Director of Development for the Kosciuszko Foundation and the Historic House Trust of New York City, Grants Administrator for the International Women's Health Coalition, and Director of Publications at the Brooklyn Academy of Music (BAM). Mr. Broadwell graduated from Grinnell College with a BA in English.

Edward Mohylowski, Deputy Executive Director, joined the ESU in April 2014. He oversees development, membership, budgeting, and a range of related administrative and managerial functions. He previously served in fundraising capacities at John Jay College of Criminal Justice, World Monuments Fund, Environmental Defense Fund, and The New York Botanical Garden. Prior to his fundraising career, Mr. Mohylowski worked in the field of historic preservation at the New York City Landmarks Preservation Commission and the New York Landmarks Conservancy. As an Associate at Jane Clark Chermayeff Associates in New York City, Carol continued to work with national and international cultural, history, science, and children's museums, and governmental organizations on exhibition planning and development, master planning and interpretive programming. She holds a BA from Harvard University and MA from the University of Pennsylvania.

Rossana Ivanova, Director, Development, oversees the planning and implementation of a comprehensive fundraising program that secures unrestricted and restricted support from foundations, corporations and individuals. Previously, as Deputy Director of the Washington Office of Amnesty International USA, she led successful human rights advocacy campaigns, testified as an expert witness at U.S. Congressional hearings on multiple occasions and was a frequent commentator on Latin American human rights issues for print and electronic media outlets.
