Introduction

Evelyn Wrench Speakers Series Source List is a compilation of popular speakers who have participated in our programs. We encourage our ESU Branches to take advantage of their knowledge as they plan their programs. These speakers live in the US or the UK, and are delighted to share their expertise with ESU members around the country. The Sourcelist has been recently updated to reflect current contact information, and also to introduce new speakers we recommend.

When scheduling lectures, Branch Speaker Contacts should contact Sourcelist speakers directly at least three to four months in advance of the event date. You may also want to contact other Branches to arrange additional lectures for a short tour. Headquarters is able to provide up-to-date information on current Branch officers. Email addresses for the speakers are provided in the Sourcelist entries, but for additional contact information please be in touch with Helena Fontaine or 212-818-1200.

Financial terms:

Honorarium:	Can be paid by the Branch in cash or check at the time of the lecture.	
<u>Transportation:</u>	Branches should cover the costs of all speaker travel, including transportation, lodging, meals and any additional hospitality. Branch Speaker Contacts should be able to help coordinate all travel arrangements, especially local transportation.	
Accommodation:	The Branch provides meals and at least one night's accommodation in a private home, club or hotel.	

About the lectures:

Lectures should last no more than 45 minutes, followed by ten minutes of Q and A. Lectures should be delivered clearly, in a conversational tone, and without being read, although the use of notes is fine. Sourcelist speakers usually address one or more of the following topics: History, Art, Current Events, Gardens History, Language Literature, Music, Poetry, Politics, Theater and Travel

All information about the event such as time, location, dress code, schedule, and contact, should be communicated to the speaker well in advance of the program. Speakers may not use ESU events to solicit funds for any personal cause or preferred organization.

NOTE: Inclusion in the Sourcelist is not a guarantee of an ESU speaking engagement.

Technical equipment:

Each entry indicates the speaker's technical requirements. If the speaker is illustrating his/her lecture with slides or PowerPoint, please consult with the speaker about any specific requirements. See the following page for set-up tips. Please be sure that:

- The lecture room can be darkened
- You have a run-through of the presentation with the speaker well in advance to check the sound system, audio-visual equipment, and to make sure the speaker is comfortable with your available technology (i.e. provided computer, remote controls, etc.)
- if the speaker plans to bring his/her own device (i.e. laptop, iPad, etc.) please make certain the venue has appropriate compatibility.

Book Sales:

Many speakers are authors who will request that their books be available for sale at their lectures. Having a book signing can be an appealing addition to a program, and if the speaker is in agreement, a way to provide additional monetary support to the Branch. However, in most cases, speakers are seeking to sell their books. Some speakers may bring their own books to sell, and others may request that the Branch order from a Publisher or online

distributor such as Amazon, and keep any profits from the sale. Make sure these details are arranged well in advance of the event.

Publicity:

National Headquarters encourages the Branches to publicize their speaker programs by arranging local media coverage and to open them to non-ESU members. When announcing a speaker event, the Branch should require advance registration in order to avoid overcrowding.

Ticket Sales:

Branches are encouraged to charge minimal fees to purchase tickets to speaker programs to defray any costs that might be incurred. Online ticket vendors such as PayPal, Event Brite and Paper Bag Tickets can be extremely helpful, both to track attendance and also to reduce administrative time spent by the Branch responding to questions and maintaining lists. Branches might consider a "tiered" fee structure for lectures with the cheapest ticket going to ESU National Patrons, with a slightly more expensive ticket for ESU members, and the most expensive ticket for non-members as a way to encourage them to become members.

The English-Speaking Blending of the United States reserves the right to use the names and images of participants in its speaker programs for informational or promotional use in its printed and electronic publications.

Set-up Tips for Illustrated Lectures

PowerPoint

Equipment required:

- Digital projector with power cord and laptop cable (extra long if possible)
- Screen
- Compatible power cords for PC and/or Apple product.
- UK/US adaptor, for use with speaker's laptop if necessary
- Remote control to advance PowerPoint slides
- Laser pointer (often part of the remote control)

Determine well in advance of the event who will provide the laptop: the speaker or the Branch. In either case, if the laptop is an Apple computer, you may need a separate adaptor for the projector.

If the speaker provides a laptop, be sure to have a UK/US adapter for the power cord.

If the Branch provides laptop:

- Load the presentation onto the hard drive from the speaker's flash drive. Ask the speaker for this ahead of time.
- On the laptop, go to the Control Panel and then to Power Options. On the Power Schemes page, choose Never for all settings on the drop down menus. This will keep the screen from going to sleep in the middle of the presentation.
- Please make certain you are aware of the settings needed to prevent the presentation device from going into sleep-mode during the presentation.

IMPORTANT: If you are in a new venue or one that you are not familiar with, make sure to contact the facilities manager in advance of the event to run through logistics, as noted below. Request, if possible, that a facilities person be present during the event to assist/troubleshoot.

If it is feasible for the presenter and Branch contact, try to have a run through prior to the event.

- Make sure the speaker is comfortable with the presentation space, height of podium, if used, need for speaker seating (stool or chair). Ask about these considerations well in advance of presentation.
- Always provide a pitcher of water and a glass, or bottled water.
- Check with the speaker to make sure he/she is comfortable with temperature and adjust if necessary.

Patrick Allitt is the Cahoon Family Professor of American History at Emory University in Atlanta, but he was born and raised in Derbyshire, England. From 2004 to 2007, he was the Director of Emory's Center for Teaching and Curriculum, and, from 2000 to 2004, he held the title of N.E.H./Arthur Blank Professor of Teaching. Patrick received his B.A. (honors) in Modern History from Oxford in 1977 and his Ph.D. from the University of California, Berkeley in 1986. Postdoctoral fellowships include: Henry Luce Fellow, Harvard Divinity School, 1985 to1988; Fellow, Princeton Center for the Study of American Religion, 1992 to 1993.

His most recent book is A Climate of Crisis: America in the Age of Environmentalism (Penguin, 2014). Others include I'm the Teacher, You're the Student (University of Pennsylvania Press, 2005); Religion in America Since 1945: A History (Columbia University Press, 2003) and The Conservatives: Ideas and Personalities Throughout American History (Yale University Press, 2009). In addition, Patrick has produced eight audio and video series with "The Great Courses," including "American Religious History" (24 half-hour episodes); "Victorian Britain" (36 half-hour episodes); and "The Industrial Revolution" (36 half-hour episodes). He contributes to the Spectator in London and lectures each summer on Silversea cruise ships.

PRESENTATIONS:

- Shakespeare's Role in the Lincoln Assassination -- Fresh perspectives on a playwright who was behind the most dramatic event in American history. Stirring material on John Wilkes Booth and his family, on the President and on such influential works as *Hamlet, Julius Caesar*, and *Macbeth*.
- Old Light on Shakespeare's Dramatic and Poetic Texts -- An editor's look at how the language to be found in the original 16th- and 17thcentury printings of Shakespeare's works differs from what we experience when we read modern editions or hear his words delivered in today's theaters.
- Shakespeare as an American Playwright -- Do today's British citizens have a greater claim on Shakespeare's artistic legacy than do descendants of their ancestors' relatives who crossed the Atlantic in the 16th and 17th centuries? If not, should American actors feel that their counterparts in the U.K. enjoy special advantages when they produce plays such as *Romeo and Juliet*?

John F. Andrews is President of The Shakespeare Guild, an organization that presents the annual Sir John Gielgud Award for Excellence in the Dramatic Arts and hosts dialogues under such headings as "Speaking of Shakespeare" and "Spotlight on Theater." From 1974 to 1984 he served as Director of Academic Programs at the Folger Shakespeare Library, where he edited *Shakespeare Quarterly* and oversaw a prominent center for Renaissance studies. His publications include two collections of Shakespeare's works, one in cloth for The Literary Guild (1989-92), the second in paperback for The Everyman Library (1993-98). In 1985 he compiled a three-volume reference set, William Shakespeare: His World, His Work, His Influence, for Scribners, with Anthony Burgess, Sir John Gielgud, Jonathan Miller, and Sir Peter Ustinov among its 60 contributors. He has taught at several universities and has lectured throughout the United States, as well as in Canada, Egypt, England, and Japan. Among the notables he has interviewed are such luminaries as Edward Albee, F. Murray Abraham, Jane Alexander, Sir Derek Jacobi, Kevin Kline, Sir Ian McKellen, Christopher Plummer, Lynn Redgrave, and Patrick Stewart. The War Memoir of (HRH) Wallis, Duchess of Windsor

Wallis Simpson was the first person to be named Woman of the Year by Time Magazine, but was her romance with the King of England really the greatest love story of the twentieth century? Or was it something else entirely? Was Wallis a pawn, put into play by Allied statesmen determined to remove a Nazi sympathizer from the throne? This lecture is based on Kate Auspitz's recent novel of the same name (UK edition: Wallis: My War) which purports to be the Duchess of Windsor's World War II memoir. It so perfectly captures her voice, and is so meticulously researched, that this interpretation of history seems entirely plausible. Grounded in published recollections of the major figures of the time, and in Wallis's letters, most particularly to her aunt and confidante, Bessie Merryman, as well as the collection of letters exchanged with the Prince of Wales during their courtship, the memoir is by turns fascinating, hilarious, and profoundly sad. Wallis emerges not as history's most shameless gold digger, justly reviled, but a figure far more consequential. When all is said and done, she had an unwitting heroic quality that saw her – and the Allies – through to victory.

Kate Auspitz is a political historian, Fulbright fellow at Lady Margaret Hall, Oxford, and a Harvard Ph.D. She taught at Harvard University and Wellesley College before leaving academia for practical politics. She now works on foreign policy, immigration, and refugee issues.

His Redcoat Revolutionary War characters play regularly for the National Park Service at Bunker Hill, Saratoga, Cowpens, Guilford Courthouse and Yorktown. The BBC has frequently filmed Mr. Burnham's work. In 1972, he was elected a Fellow of the Royal Society of Arts in London. He has performed as an Evelyn Wrench speaker for Branches in Regions I, II, III, IV, V and VI.



Breaking the Barrier with a 'Steam Coffin' (with book signing)

John Laurence Busch will attempt to re-calibrate your mind before showing why the proposition of making the first crossing of the Atlantic Ocean on a "steamship" was met with a mixture of skepticism and fear. Then he will show how a group of early American technologists--nearly all of whom were descendants of families from the United Kingdom of England, Ireland, Scotland and Wales--addressed those fears by building one of the most revolutionary vessels in history. John's multi-media presentation also will illustrate how some of the brightest minds in Britain reacted to this "Wonder of the Age," by vowing to catch up to the Americans. In so doing, Captain Moses Rogers and his steamship *Savannah* ignited what became the most important technological rivalry in the history of the world. This presentation, which is tailor-made for English Speaking Union branches, is based upon John's book, *STEAM COFFIN: Captain Moses Rogers and The Steamship Savannah Break the Barrier*.

John Laurence Busch is an independent historian who specializes in the first generation of steam-powered vessels and their revolutionary role in the creation of the modern world. His book, **STEAM COFFIN** (2010), has been reviewed positively by more than two dozen periodicals based in the United States, Canada, the United Kingdom and Australia. John has made over 300 presentations on Captain Rogers and the *Savannah* to a wide variety of audiences, stretching from Maine to Puerto Rico to California , and across the Atlantic Ocean to Europe. The British Empire Military History Since the 18th Century Winston Churchill

After earning his degree at Harvard, Raymond Callahan taught British and Military History for 38 years at the University of Delaware and also served in a variety of administrative positions there, retiring as Associate Dean and Professor of History. He was the John F. Morrison Visiting Professor of Military History at the US Army Command and General Staff College and a regular lecturer at the US Marine Corps Staff College. He has also lectured at the US Army and US Air Force War Colleges and at the Joint Services Command and Staff College in the UK. Mr. Callahan is the author of four books, three of which deal with the Second World War and is a series editor of *Modern War Studies* for the University Press of Kansas. In addition to winning an Excellence in Teaching Award from the University of Delaware, he was elected National President of The Association of Graduate Liberal Studies Programs. He also served as a member of the US Army's Historical Advisory Committee and as a board member of The Winston Churchill Memorial and Library in Fulton, Missouri. Mr. Callahan was elected a Fellow of The Royal Historical Society in 1985.

Frances Hodgson Burnett



This lecture follows the famous author who moved from England to America as a teenager and who made another 32 crossings. The author of *The Secret Garden, A Little Princess, and Little Lord Fauntleroy* also wrote dozens of best-selling novels for adults, dealing with such serious issues as single mothers and abusive marriages. Her personal life was considered shocking for Victorian times. This lecture offers historical photographs and recent pictures of sites from Burnett's life. Accompanies the books *Frances Hodgson Burnett: Beyond the Secret Garden* and *In the Garden: Essays in Honor of Frances Hodgson Burnett.*

Heather to Hibiscus

This lecture follows Robert Louis Stevenson from Scotland to the South Seas. The author of *Treasure Island, Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde* and *A Child's Garden of Verses* was born in 1850 to a wealthy Edinburgh family. He met his American wife-to-be in France. Stevenson later traveled to America and on three voyages through the South Seas. This virtual tour shows historical photos and current views of Edinburgh, France, California and Samoa. Accompanies the book *Robert Louis Stevenson: Finding Treasure Island*.

Lewis Carroll

Charles Dodgson went to Christ Church, Oxford, as an undergraduate and remained there all his life, teaching mathematics. He wrote *Alice's Adventures in Wonderland* and *Through the Looking-Glass* for his child friend, Alice Liddell, daughter of the college dean, basing the books on her real life experiences. He is considered the most important photographer of children from the Victorian era, but his friendships with little girls and his photos of some of them undressed make him a controversial subject 100 years after his death. Accompanies the book *Lewis Carroll: Through the Looking Glass*.

Magical Sabbatical

Take a virtual tour of children's literature collections and sites. See highlights of collections at Roehampton University in Surrey; the Bodleian Library in Oxford; the Victoria and Albert Museum; Seven Stories, The Centre for the Children's Book, at Newcastle upon Tyne; and English language collections at the National Library of the Netherlands, and the International Youth Library, Munich. Includes photos of programs sponsored by the Lewis Carroll Society, a visit to The Dinosaurs of Waterhouse Hawkins in Crystal Palace Park, and photos from a home interview with Jacqueline Wilson as she was appointed Children's Laureate of Britain.

"Crummles" is a Theatrical Production, which gives a vivid and amusing picture of the Life and Characters of a Provincial Theatre Touring Company in the early 19th century, filtered through the genius of Charles Dickens. "

Dramatic Reading Adapted from the Poems & Letters of A.E. Housman – Take Desire Away Explores the emotional life of the poet through his own poems and personal letters.

Born and raised in Camarthen, South Wales, Mansel David earned a double B.A. (Honors) in Drama and English literature from the University of Bristol, before training as an actor at the Bristol Old Vic Theatre School. He has worked as a professional actor in theater, television and radio for over 35 years. While at the West End Theatre, Mr. David worked with some of England's greatest stage actors. During the 1990s, he worked as a founder/member of the Pyramid Theatre Company, specializing in issue-based theater and touring throughout the British Isles and Ireland. He also performed David Rowe's *A House of Leaves*, a one-man show based on the life of Wales' greatest poet, Dafydd Ap Gwilym, which toured throughout Wales in 1995 and later to Scotland, Ireland, California and Texas. In 2008, Mr. David played the role of 'Niels Bohr' in a special production of Michael Frayn's play *Copenhagen* for Northwestern University, Chicago.

TOPICS: The Iconic Art Deco Era

Presenting on all elements of the art deco era, including architecture, art and design including the eminent and pioneering individuals from this iconic socially unique period of the twentieth century. Lectures, talks, day schools and courses can be tailored to suit the individual needs of the host.

After graduating in English Language and Humanities, Genista followed a career in teaching English and Social history both at home in the UK and overseas in Madrid and at the Pablo Olavide University, Seville (2007-2009). Acquiring an MA in Art History Genista worked for a charitable non-profit organization and the WEA (Workers Education Association) that offers accessible partially funded courses for adults without a higher level of education. Genista is passionate about the social history from c1920-1940 and has a specialized teaching program and course of lectures from this period covering a wide range of topics and subjects. Having extensively travelled worldwide and experienced first-hand the effects that the Art Deco era had on all sectors of society has subsequently greatly enhanced and influenced Genista's appreciation and knowledge of her specialized area. She has regularly appeared in newspapers and magazines throughout the UK and has published four books in her Art Deco Traveller series. Two further books - an Art Deco Almanac and Art Deco Anecdotes are due to be published summer 2020. Genista is registered with the National Trust and gives guided tours and talks at two of its properties - the 1939 Modernist home of the architect Erno Goldfinger (1902-1987) in Hampstead and Carlton Fishacre in Devon that is an Arts & Crafts designed property that is entirely furnished and decorated in the Art Deco style being the former home of the D'oyly Carte Opera family. Genista is the Chairman and a Founder member of the Art Deco Society of the U.K.

"Such Friends": Scribner's Editor, Maxwell Perkins and his work with F.Scott Fitzgerald, Ernest Hemmingway and/or Thomas Wolfe

Based on her book, *Manager as Muse*, this lecture focuses on the legendary Scribner's editor, Maxwell Perkins and his work with his most challenging authors. Clips from the motion picture, *Genius*, starring Colin Firth as Perkins and Jude Law can be used.

Britain Before the Great War: The Irish Literary Renaissance and the Bloomsbury Group While WB Yeats' circle organized the Abbey theatre in Dublin, Virginia Woolf and her crowd reinvented art and literature in the townhouses of Bloomsbury and cottages of Sussex. Until The Great War, the British sat in drawing rooms, talking over whisky, buns and cocoa, late into the night. This presentation looks at the 'homefront' during the war for both groups.

"Such Friends": Dorothy Parker and Her Men

'I loved them until they loved me,' 1920s poet Dorothy Parker opined in one of her short poems. Her work might be classified as light verse, but most of her bitter pieces were written with a heavy heart. This talk is popular around St. Valentine's day!

Happy Bloomsday! James Joyce in Dublin and Paris

James Joyce left Dublin for the continent in 1904, moved to Paris in 1920, and spent most of the rest of his life there. Unlike the American writers, Joyce kept to himself but frequented Paris cafés, bursting into song after a few drinks, rolling home drunk in a taxi. A great way to celebrate Bloomsday on or around June 16th.

"Such Friends:" Supporters of the Arts in the Early 20th Century

What can we learn from those who started and funded the arts at the turn of the last century? The founders of the Abbey Theatre, the Omega Workshops and The New Yorker magazine as well as patrons of writers and artists like James Joyce and Henri Matisse had creative ways of supporting their artistic endeavors. This can be combined with a panel of representatives of local arts organizations for a longer program.

Kathleen Dixon Donnelly, Ph.D., is a writer and teacher of many subjects, from marketing and public relations to literature and creative thinking and has studied and taught in Ireland, the UK and the US, Her research has focused on the creative development of writers in the early 20th-century salons, the Irish Literary Renaissance, the Bloomsbury Group, American expatriates in Paris, and the Algonquin Round Table in New York. She has given presentations about these "Such Friends" at many prestigious institutions in the UK, as well as numerous lifelong learning programs in the US. Princes Gate

Mark Ellis will talk about his book, *Princes Gate*, set in London in the early years of World War II. This new crime novel mixes historical and fictional characters and features the charismatic half-Spanish detective, Frank Merlin. In his lecture, Mr. Ellis will capture the atmosphere of Britain in 1940 during the "phony war;" when, although war raged on the Continent, life continued relatively peacefully in Britain.

Stalin's Gold

This lecture is based on Ellis' second mystery, *Stalin's Gold*, again featuring detective, Frank Merlin and set in Europe during the time of the Battle of Britain. Sweeping from Stalin's Russia to Civil War Spain, from Aztec Mexico to pre-war Poland, and from Hitler's Berlin to Churchill's London, Ellis tells a compelling story of treasure, grand larceny, treachery, torture and murder.

Born in Windsor, Mark Ellis was educated in Wales and spent a year in Pittsburgh as an ESU exchange student. He graduated from Cambridge and practiced law as a barrister for a short time before going into corporate finance and management. He co-founded a computer services firm, 4Front Technologies, and after its expansion and sale, he scaled down his business activities and began devoting more time to writing. Mr. Ellis's business interests continue, including serving as an independent director for two American companies. He is currently working on his second Frank Merlin novel, *The Polish Squadron*. He has lived in New York and Los Angeles and now resides in London with his wife

Jane Austen and the Slave Trade: Austen's England was hotly divided over the trans-Atlantic Slave Trade. She never wrote directly about it, but her favorite authors were abolitionists. There are references in *Mansfield Park* and *Emma*. And she claims to have once been "in love" with its most ardent abolitionist, Thomas Clarkson.

Dr. Samuel Johnson and Hester Thrale, later Piozzi: The friendship between the lexicographer and his blue-stocking hostess, who compared themselves to *"The Rattlesnake and the Elephant."* With paintings by Hogarth, Rowlandson, Reynolds, Richard Wilson, Francis Hayman and George Hayman.

Fanny Mendelssohn Hensel: Brilliant composer sister of Felix Mendelssohn; her passionate life, her witty, sharp and intelligent letters and exquisite music. With landscape paintings by Caspar David Friedrich.

Florence Nightingale: Karin brings to life some of Nightingale's passions, ideas and preoccupations before and after the Crimean War. From letters and diaries. With paintings and drawings by Jerry Barrett, Parthenope Nightingale, Hilary Bonham-Carter and Nightingale's aunt Julia Smith.

Queen Victoria: 'I was most excessively delighted!!': Young Victoria delighted with opera, ballet and the theatre and wrote about them in her diary. This talk is illustrated by her own watercolors and sketches from the Windsor Archives, together with other paintings and portraits.

My Year as the First American Lady Mayoress of Westminster, London

"Do you believe in fairy tales? While I did not find a prince, my life changed completely when I was unexpectedly asked to be the Lady Mayoress of Westminster, London, the first American to hold this position.

"One day I was working for a small investment banking firm and the next day I was in London with two chauffeurs, two macebearers, a private secretary, an office staff and a mayoral flat in fashionable Mayfair. I met royalty, presidents, ambassadors, cabinet ministers and traveled officially around the world with the Lord Mayor of Westminster. I truly lived the life of royalty dinner at Buckingham Palace, regal ceremonies and the glamour of Princess Diana until the clock struck midnight and I had to return to the US. The beginning of the story goes back in time to my years at Cambridge University and is a fascinating tale."

A native New Englander, Carole Franco was the first American Lady Mayoress of Westminster. Prior to that, she was employed as a Senior Advisor to a privately owned investment-banking firm, Strategic Partners International. Ms. Franco also spent a portion of her time working with AmeriCares, a charitable organization that donates medicines and medical supplies to Third World countries. With AmeriCares, she participated in airlifts to Russia, Congo-Brazzaville, Albania and South Sudan. In 1993, in conjunction with the Soros Foundation, she organized a tour to America for three Albanian artists to exhibit their works. Ms. Franco earned her undergraduate degree from Duke University and went on to receive her Masters in International Relations from Cambridge University where she met the former Lord Mayor, Councilor Robert Davis. Her background includes teaching; research on a biography of Sumner Welles, the Under Secretary of State under President Franklin Roosevelt; working for an international consulting firm in New York City and fundraising for three biotech companies with patents for neurological and cardiovascular diseases. A versatile woman, she created her own company, Kingdom Productions, which undertook the groundwork for the production of an epic film about Abdul Aziz Ibn Saud, the founder of the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia.

Lovely Transatlantic Invaders: American Women in Victorian London

Taken from Edith Wharton's novel *The Buccaneers*, this phrase describes the many young American women who came to the UK between 1870 and WWI making places for themselves in English life. Many were wealthy and married into titled families; others were independent professionals, Dr. Gabin's talk provides an overview of this group of determined, talented and independent women who contributed to the literary, political, social and artistic life of their adopted country. Some of their stories are romantic, some are tragic, but all are compelling.

Jennie Jerome Churchill: An Extraordinary Woman

Jennie was so much more than a society leader and the mother of the future Prime Minister; she was active in political life, founded a literary journal, and wrote for the stage.

American Women on the Victorian Stage

The prevailing opinion in 19th-century England and America was that an actress was little more than a woman of the streets. Mary Anderson changed that. She made her stage debut in 1877 age 17, demure and always accompanied by her mother. Audiences fell in love with her. America's first transatlantic celebrity transformed the way people felt about the theatre.

The "Uncrowned Queen of Americans in London"

Mary Frances Ronalds, a socialite from Boston, moved to Paris and then London, where she became a favorite of Queen Victoria. Charming and talented, she made her home at Cadogan Place, the gathering spot of the American community. She played a pivotal role in London life for many years, but has had no biographer until this reconstruction of her moving story.

Elizabeth Banks: an American on Fleet Street

She left the U.S. in 1892 because England offered more opportunities for female journalists. . She posed as a housemaid, flower seller and heiress to write exposes. Ultimately, she became a very popular columnist, contributing to over dozens of newspapers and magazines. When the English-Speaking Union formed in London in 1918, Banks was one of its first members.

Dr. Jane S. Gabin is an educator and writer living in Chapel Hill, North Carolina. She earned her Ph.D. in literature at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill and has taught there, at Queens College in New York, and at the NYU School of Professional Studies. Currently an independent educational consultant, she worked as a college counselor in the New York metropolitan area for eleven years, and previously worked in university admissions. Dr. Gabin has published three books, the most recent of which is *American Women in Gilded Age London: Expatriates Rediscovered*, and has also contributed to several encyclopedias and volumes of essays. In addition, she currently writes an online college admission advice column at www.insideschools.org.

In the summer of 1995, Sam Goodyear portrayed John Adams in the Leatherstocking Theatre Company premier production of Howard Ginsberg's *Jefferson and Adams* in Cooperstown, New York. He has been connected with multiple productions of the play ever since, including: annual Fourth of July performance at Colonial Williamsburg since 2001 with acclaimed Thomas Jefferson interpreter Bill Barker; appearances with Sam Waterston at the Circle Repertory Theater and the Century Association in New York; national airing of an Emmy-nominated Colonial Williamsburg Productions DVD of the play on PBS on July 4th, 2005; a return engagement at Peacefield, the Adams homestead in Quincy, Massachusetts, on July 4th, 2006. He portrayed John Adams at the initiation of the US mint in Quincy, Massachusetts for the first day of issue of the new John Adams coin in May 2007.

In addition to performances of the play itself, he has been invited to appear as John Adams at historical societies and museums, in schools, at private functions, as well as at the annual meeting of the Colonial Dames in 2005 in Mobile, Alabama.

Will China rule the World?

On his first visit to China, during the tumult of the Cultural Revolution, Christopher Hum watched Chairman Mao receive the adoration of his Red Guards. He lived there in all for ten years, as a diplomat and as British Ambassador between 2002 and 2005, and saw its transformation into the superpower it is today. In his lecture he gives a first-hand account of China's rise and asks whether today's resurgent China is a threat or an opportunity for the world.

Christopher Hum joined Her Majesty's Diplomatic Service in 1967 and much of his diplomatic career was connected with China. He studied Chinese at Hong Kong University and went on to spend a total of eight years in postings to the British Embassy in Beijing, culminating in four years as British Ambassador (2002-2005). He also served in the Asian departments of the Foreign and Commonwealth Office, and for several years was closely involved in the negotiations on the return of Hong Kong to China. Other overseas postings included Brussels (European Communities), Paris, the United Nations in New York and Warsaw (as Ambassador, 1996-1998).

Between 2006 and 2012 Christopher Hum was Master of Gonville and Caius College Cambridge, where he remains as a Life Fellow. Darwin and the British Empire

As the British Empire expanded in the early years of the 19th century, attention to foreign lands grew at home beyond the interest of merchants and colonial officials. Public interest in the exotic lands of Australia, Africa, and the Pacific was fed by traveling naturalists on dramatic expeditions. Charles Darwin and other explorers brought home more than natural history objects and tales of derring-do. Kimler describes the travels of a selection of these naturalists, as well as their work as innovative scientists. They developed the new sciences of ecology and evolution, using experiences made possible by the imperial vision.

The Genius of Charles Darwin

-- what Darwin did, and the historical trajectory of his reputation, as a way of asking what we mean by "genius".

How Charles Darwin Discovered Evolution

-- the story and the myths about how Darwin discovered his theory.

The Exploration of the Tropics by Victorian Naturalists and Artists -- how we gained an image of tropical wonders and luxuriance through the travels, books, and paintings of Victorian explorers.





In this sweep through world military history, strategy, and logistics, Lee explores the "four pillars" of conquest (the titular governor, priest, tax man and garrison) and he then compares how those same pillars worked in non-state societies on the Eurasian steppe and in the Native American woodlands.

Speaking Through Skulls: Objects of Death and the Culture of Soldiers in the Eighteenth-Century Anglo-American World

Examines widespread beliefs and superstitions about objects associated with death, and then examines how such beliefs might have affected Continental soldiers on Sullivan's Expedition against the Iroquois in 1779.

Trafalgar

An exploration of the problems of "scale" in the warfare of the Age of Sail, focusing on Trafalgar as an example of the many ways that British society committed extraordinary human, material, and fiscal resources to naval warfare.

- *Fortify, Fight, or Flee: Comparing the Tuscarora and Cherokee Response to English Invasions* A study of Native military culture, and how they tried to deal with the military problem of defending the home village, using the Tuscarora War of 1712-15 and the Cherokee War of 1759-61 as examples.
- Mercenaries, Allies, or Subjects?: Recruiting the Locals on the Irish Borderlands of the 16th Century A look at the ways the English employed a wide array of strategies for utilizing local military labor in the borderlands of 16th century Ireland.

The Past and Present of Targeted Drone Strikes: Technology, Law, and Strategy Examines the complex history of how we got to where we are in relying on drone strikes. Per the title, includes technology development, doctrinal preference, debates over legality, and the question of strategic effectiveness.

Wayne E. Lee is a Distinguished Professor of History at the University of North Carolina. Author of *Barbarians and Brothers: Anglo-American Warfare, 1500-1865* (2011) and *Crowds and Soldiers in Revolutionary North Carolina* (2001), he has also edited two volumes on world military history (both 2011) and in 2015 published a survey of world military history for Oxford University Press, entitled *Waging War: Conflict, Culture, and Innovation in World History*. He has an additional career as an archaeologist, having done field work in Greece, Albania, Hungary, Croatia, and Virginia, including co-directing two field projects, and was a principal author and co-editor of *Light and Shadow: Isolation and Interaction in the Shala Valley of Northern Albania,* winner of the 2014 Society for American Archaeology's book award. In2015/2016 he was the Harold K. Johnson Visiting Professor of Military History at the U.S. Army War College in Carlisle, Pennsylvania.


--*Eighteen Minutes That Changed the World - The Sinking of the Lusitania*, is based on *her* definitive *Lusitania: An Epic Tragedy.* The Cunard liner *Lusitania* sailed from New York on May 1, 1915 to be sunk by a German submarine without warning six days later. This attack on civilians during the first year of the First World War provoked international condemnation. This is a story of personal tragedy on the scale of "Titanic" but also a geopolitical tale with special resonance in the year we mark the centenary of the outbreak of the 'war to end all wars.'

Diana Preston is an acclaimed British author and historian, graduate of Oxford University and Fellow of the Royal Geographical Society. She is the author of the definitive *Lusitania: An Epic Tragedy; Before the Fallout: From Marie Curie to The Boxer Rebellion;* and *The Dark Defile: Britain's Catastrophic Invasion of Afghanistan, 1838–1842; among other works of narrative history.* Her most recent book *Eight Days at Yalta* about the 1945 Yalta Conference was published in the UK in October 2019 and comes out in the US in February 2020.

Under the pseudonym Alex Rutherford, Diana, with her husband Michael, is author of the best-selling Empire of the Moghul sextet of historical novels launched in the UK, USA and India where each reached number one. The books are now being filmed by Disney's Indian arm, Star TV and have been optioned and are under development by Hollywood

As well as lecturing for the ESU, including as a Wrench Fellow, Diana has lectured at The Smithsonian Institution, The Los Angeles Times Book Festival, The Peabody Essex Museum, New York's Museum of Natural History, the UK and US National War Museums, the National Maritime Museums in London and Sydney and the Edinburgh Book Festival. She has appeared in documentaries and interviews on BBC TV, CNN, CSPAN, the Discovery and History Channels, Smithsonian TV and many PBS radio and TV stations. He has also "pundited" on BBC, CNN, MSNBC, FOX, CBC and innumerable radio stations, for example appearing on "Hardball with Chris Matthews," "The O'Reilly Factor," and Wolf Blitzer. Online, he writes for Salon, AlterNet and MaximsNews, among many others. His books include: *The Alms Trade*, a study of the role of charities in Britain; *The U.N. for Beginners; Deserter*, published by Nation Books in July 2004; *Rum: A Social & Sociable History of the Real Spirit of 1776*, and his latest *Tequila: A Global History*. - Sister Parish: American Style -- Sister Parish was the grande dame of American 20thcentury decorators. Parish-Hadley, the decorating firm she founded and ran with Albert Hadley was extremely successful and produced a huge body of work. Sister's most famous client was Jacqueline Kennedy, for whom she worked at the White House and at Glen Ora, a presidential retreat in Virginia. Martin Wood discusses the sumptuous and prolific work of Sister Parish, grande dame of American 20th-century decorators.
- Designer to the Nation: John Fowler and English Country House Style During the course of his career, interior designer John Fowler was responsible for transforming some of Britain's important historic interiors, including Sudbury Hall, Chequers and Buckingham Palace. In 1938 he co-founded the design firm, Colefax and Fowler. Fowler's pioneering mix of painted furniture and cotton chintzes with old collections of art and objects created a new look for historic interiors in keeping with the romantic taste of the 20th century. Drawing upon his extensive research, Martin Wood will sketch Fowler's career from his early work to the last major house he decorated, showing the development of his style and taste.
- Nancy Lancaster: English Country House Style -- Nancy Lancaster was one of the premier tastemakers of the 20th century and created what is known as the "English Country House Style." The owner of the design firm, Colefax & Fowler, Nancy had an assured sense of scale, boldness, a sharp wit, and an instinctive understanding of how to make a house mellow, elegant and unpretentious. In this lecture, Martin Wood discusses her own houses and gardens as well as her work for Colefax and Fowler. He also considers Nancy's remarkable personal life, her dynamic design partnership with John Fowler, and her friends and family, including Nancy Astor, Duff and Lady Diana Cooper, David Niven and Winston Churchill.

Martin Wood is a designer of textiles, interiors and gardens, as well as an author. His books include *Gertrude Jekyll at Munstead Wood* (1996), *Nancy Lancaster: English Country House Style* (2005), *John Fowler: Prince of Decorators* (2007), *Laura Ashley* (2009), and *Sister Parrish: American Style* (2011).
