



## "The European Union In Crisis"

The European Union faces deep and serious challenges. A debt and Euro-currency imbalance has threatened the sovereign default



of Portugal, Italy, Greece, and Spain. Economic stagnancy, high unemployment, especially among youth, fosters an emerging anti-European mentality. A migration crisis with hundreds of thousands of refugees from the Middle East and Africa challenges the "open borders" policy within the European Union, stressing the system even further. Radical terrorism is a growing threat. New security challenges from a resurgent Russia question NATO's cohesion and viability in response to Russia's claims on Ukraine and potentially other states formerly part of the Soviet Union. With serious internal and external challenges, Europe might enter a long period of disunity. The European Union may not collapse but will need a fundamental overhaul of its institutions.

Dr. Dieter Dettke is Adjunct Professor at Georgetown University and the BMW Center for German and European Studies, where he teaches courses on European security and Europe-Russia relations. He is the author of numerous publications, including Germany Says 'No': The Iraq War and the Future of German Foreign and Security Policy. As former Executive Director of the Friedrich Ebert Foundation in Washington, DC, a major German policy institution, he is well-known in the transatlantic community as a voice of clarity and vision.

## Michael Neiberg

"The Road Over There: America and the Great War 1914-1917"



The common explanation for the outbreak of World War I depicts Europe as a minefield of nationalism, needing only the slightest pressure to set off an explosion of passion that would rip the continent apart. In a crucial reexamination of the outbreak of violence in his book Dance of the Furies, Neiberg shows that ordinary Europeans, unlike their political and military leaders, neither wanted nor expected war during the fateful summer of 1914. What would lead the United States to travel the road over there in 1917?



#### Dr. John Turner

"The Rise and Fall of the Great American Songs"

Dr. John Turner, a former professor of psychology with an academic specialty in



George Gershwin, Cole Porter, Irving Berlin, Hoagy Carmichael, Duke Ellington and others are among a group of American composers who wrote the melody for classic songs that have become standards and today are often referred to as "The Great American Songbook." These writers, along with writers like Ira Gershwin and Lorenz Hart, who wrote the lyrics to these songs, lived during a time when authors and composers were given recognition and adulation that only today's most famous rock stars receive. Between 1935 and 1950, the music listening and buying public lost interest. What happened to those songs of "The Great American Songbook?"

Through music, video and commentary, Dr. Turner will provide an entertaining and informative look at the changes in American music of the late 1940's and 1950's and in the songwriters and popular singers who brought that music to us.

# Craig Johnson "Longmire and Me"

Craig Johnson is the New York Times bestselling author of the Walt Longmire, Sheriff of Absaroka County, series. To

date there are fifteen novels in the series, from which a very successful television program, Longmire, has been created. The fifth season is currently in production via Netflix.

Many of the novels, as well as the author, have received awards and recognition from fellow mystery writers and the literary world. Walt Longmire has a strong international following, especially in France.

Craig will speak to the inspiration for creating Walt Longmire, the choice of locale, and the incorporation of local characters (real and imagined) in his novels. Much flows from his life in Ucross, Wyoming, population 25.

Johnson's success is celebrated in an annual Longmire Days festival in Buffalo, WY. Close to 10,000 people visit this small town, the real life inspiration for Durant.
