#### PRESIDENT'S CORNER

Dear Fellow ESU Members.

What an extraordinary time to be a member of the English-Speaking Union!

We have the joy of celebrating anniversaries in 2015 and 2016. In June 2015 we celebrated the 800<sup>th</sup> anniversary of Magna Carta, the document which resulted from the nobles and clergy meeting at Runnymede to wrest from King John the list of rights which began democratic systems. Our own Grace Sanders, a lineal descendent of three of the Barons and a member of the National Society of the Magna Carta Dames, brought and shared her official document.

We Americans celebrate a holiday to acknowledge the debt we owe to those nobles and clergy. Five Centuries later, our own rule of law followed, fitfully and sporadically, as we set out to establish a constitutional government, which we celebrate each year on July 4.

Upcoming in 2016, the anniversary of the death of William Shakespeare will present us with more chances to learn, enjoy, and celebrate that great poet and playwright. Jeff Watkins will speak to us September 22 and jump start the celebration of the legacy and works of Shakespeare by speaking about how to enjoy him more. Later in 2016, we will have the chance to view and learn about the First Folio from the Folger Library. This will be a very rare privilege. The Folger Library is allowing an ESU tour of the rare writing to be shown all over the U. S. Atlanta is on the schedule for the fall of 2016 at the Carlos Museum. May I suggest that to enhance your enjoyment of hosting the First Folio in Atlanta, you may want to read Andrea Mays' new book, The Millionaire and The Bard, the story of Henry Folger's obsessive hunt for Shakespeare's First Folio. It tells the story of locating and printing his works 8 years after his death, and then years later, the collection of the works by the wealthy American.

October 23, we will host the Sir Evelyn Wrench speaker, Simon Claxton, whose topic is William Faulkner. Invitations later. The National Annual General Meeting is meeting in New York City October 10-12. Contact me if you plan to go and you want to be one of the 5 delegates. Details are on the website, esuus.org

The ESU has a connection with the Order of St. John in that both organizations have close ties with Great Britain and both have a mission to be of service. There are four (4) members of our Branch who are members

of the Order of St. John, officially The Most Venable Order of the Hospital of the Order of St. John of Jerusalem. The honor of membership is bestowed by its sovereign head HM Queen Elizabeth II.

The Order of St. John is a chivalric order and yet the mission is one of Christian service. Over the years American members have raised millions of dollars for the St. John Eye Hospital Group, which is located in Jerusalem. This Group provides ophthalmic care to hundreds of thousands in the Holy Land without regard to race, creed or ability to pay. The Priory of the U.S. is one of 11 international priories.
