"WINSTON CHURCHILL AND HIS JOY RIDE IN A PAINT BOX"

On Tuesday evening, April 30th, the Atlanta Churchill Society joined the Atlanta Branch of the ESU for a wonderful meeting at the Cathedral of St. Philip. Kurt Travis, chairman of the meeting, arranged with Soiree a sumptuous array of heavy hors d'oeuvres and a selection of nice wines. Ubiquitous Holly Berney was there to assist. The Gould Room was packed.

President Maddrey called us to order and introduced Travis, who in turn called on Churchill Society President Bill Wilson to introduce our speaker, Duncan Sandys, the great grandson of Winston Churchill. The young and attractive Sandys, who is married to a Georgia girl, spends part of his time in Atlanta.

His entire power point lecture was about the paintings his great grandfather Winston did over his entire life time. His talk was informative, humorous and surprising. Many of us were in awe of the artistic work of Winston Churchill and were pleasantly surprised.

Gail Glattli expressed it best when she told us,

"If the idea of a man like Winston Churchill being an artist sounded incomprehensible to you, tonight's presentation was an eye-opener. Who knew he had such talent. Sure he was a great leader of the English people during a tumultuous time in history, but a painter! Seems out of character...

He started painting during the 1920's and '30's, and painting was to become a much needed outlet for him, especially when he was embroiled in the political life of Great Britain. I was surprised to find out he painted over 500 pictures during his life, and his body of work is still on display. His paint box was never far from his side along with the proverbial cigars and bottles of scotch. He painted a variety of subjects in many far flung places around the world, everything from landscapes at his beloved Chartwell home, the sun setting on the Atlas Mountains in Marrakesh, and the Cap Ferrat coastline. He was even an inspiration and encouragement to Dwight Eisenhower when he wanted to take up painting.

The name Winston Churchill may conjure up a memory of his leadership role as England's Prime Minister during the Second World War, but after this evening's presentation, I think we can appreciate his reputation in the world of art as well."

After the erudite program, the conversations and questions continued along with additional servings of the food and wine. It was quite a night!

JANE AUSTEN 200th Celebration of Pride and Prejudice

What a delightful Mothers' Day that so many of us enjoyed at the Peachtree Road United Methodist Church hearing Dr. Angie O'Neal speak about Jane Austen, after which young Laura Street play the piano and the harpsichord! Hosted and arranged by Grace Sanders, we were charmed by the lecture delivered by Dr. O'Neal, assistant professor of English at Shorter University in Rome, GA. She specializes in 18th and 19th century British Literature and teaches writing and all facets of British literature, with a favorite area in the Romantic period. She explained to us that Jane Austen had a universal appeal. Her novels were timeless and that no matter the troubles of life, there was a common thread with real people. Elizabeth possessed the feminine charm of a lovely young woman, and her story was not a romance but the story of a relationship. Her perspective was rational and good. Writing in a period of history that was revolutionary which she ignored, she was more influenced by the attitude of nature as the Romantic period was a time that nature dictated beauty and art. She used a series of painting to make that point. Gainsborough, Benard, Runciman, Friedrich, Turner and Wright were artists whose painting demonstrated her point. It was a clever connection. Her scholarly lecture amazed us. She was a master of her material.

After Dr. O'Neal's lecture, young Laura Street, a ninth grade honor student from Westminster, played two pieces on the piano and two on the harpsichord. Laura won the 2012-2013 Atlanta Steinway Society Young Prodigy Award. An accomplished flute player, she was also selected as the Conference Recitalist in the GMTA statewide Competition.

Her piano pieces were "Dawn" (the theme song composed for the Pride and Prejudice movie) by Dario Marianelli, and Sonata in E Flat HOB XLV by Haydn. On the harpsichord she played Bach's Saraband (in C minor) from The Well Tempered Clavier and Fantasia in C minor. We were in awe of such talent in one so young. Professional musician, Madonna Brownlee, commented, "Laura Street played selections on the harpsichord and on the piano with artistry and grace. Although only 15 years of age, Laura is already a virtuoso at the keyboard. Her flawless dexterity, fluency in runs and strong musicianship was evident especially in the Haydn Sonata, where she also exhibited mature control of her art."



The reception in the Whiting Garden was the perfect ending for a gathering on a glorious day of perfect weather in the south. Elizabeth Munson arranged for the lovely cakes, lemonade and tea. Thanks to Elizabeth and Grace, we enjoyed a lovely Mothers' Day.

The 5-acre historical estate, the last country estate in Washington, D.C., and a wooded paradise in the Woodley Park section, was the setting for the elegant annual Garden Party of the Washington ESU Chapter. The evening's Reception and Garden Party was a rare and gracious invitation from Her Excellency Nirupama Rao, the Ambassador of India. The residence is entitled, "The Homestead', and also overlooks Rock Creek Park. Built in 1914 it is on the National Register of historic places, Parts of the rooms and flooring were imported from Europe. After a reception in the exquisite long ballroom of the residence, we were treated to a beautiful buffet dinner with specialties of Indian cuisine. After dinner, we gathered again in the ballroom where Ambassador Rao charmed us with a welcoming speech and the fun of hearing the 'play on words' that Indian translations have with the English language (ex...'A headache is 'a singing in the head!'...the Indian English now at last uses 'cookies' instead of calling them 'little cakes'... 'a summation of all this 'play" is what Salamon Rushdie named English Chutneyism"!) ANNUAL REPORT FOR FISCAL YEAR 2012/2013

Dear Fellow Members of the Atlanta Branch:

I am pleased to offer this annual Branch report for the past fiscal year. The highlights were presented at our Annual General Meeting on April 14.

First of all, I am pleased to report that our Branch is in good fiscal condition. Net income for the year was \$4,000, some \$3,000 above our budget. The increase came from above budgeted Patron support, Member contributions, and a positive year for our investments, both in terms of stock growth as well as dividends. Our portfolio growth was outstanding this year. Our Branch membership grew from 148 to 157 members as of June 30 of this year. Successful joint meetings with the Churchill Society and the Jane Austen Society gave us opportunities to recruit like-minded members.

The Program Committee provided 8 excellent opportunities for our members in addition to the Christmas Party and the annual Garden Party at the Consul General's home. We were treated to an interesting program about the Duchess of Windsor; our Evelyn Wrench Speaker, Roger Pringle, spoke about Americans and Stratford; we heard about the War of 1812 from a Canadian's point of view; Prof. Patrick Allitt gave a wonderful talk about the English perspective of the American Civil War; we heard a lecture on the English architect, Sir Edwin Lutyens; we had a look at the painting of Sir Winston Churchill presented by his great grandson; and we heard a talk by Prof. O'Neal of Shorter College on Jane Austen.

Our annual Shakespeare Competition was led by Pam Sellman and her committee. Our Branch winner, Abigail Van Horn, was a semi-finalist at the national completion in NYC.

Our Communications Committee kept our members up to date with 4 newsletters and mailings announcing our meetings. E-Mail announcements also were sent to members on a regular basis.

Because of our good financial results, our Grants Committee recommended and the Board agreed to grants to 2 college summer interns at Georgia Shakespeare and a grant to the New Shakespeare Theatre for summer student classes. We also made grants to 2 college students and one college professor for overseas studies.

Louise Valine chaired the Walter Hines Page scholar committee. This year's scholar was Dr. Jane Laverick of Edinburgh who visited 4 of our local high schools and colleges and spoke to us at our April meeting.

At our Annual General Meeting in May, five (5) new members were voted to our Board. Dr. Manning Pattillo stepped down as our Chairman, a post that he held for 14 years. In appreciation for his commitment to the Atlanta Branch of the ESU, he was elected by the Board as Chairman Emeritus and a Grant fund was started and named for him.

It was heartening to see an increasing number of our members participate in our various committees and activities. That helps ensure a growing and healthy organization.

LANGUAGE TAKES FLIGHT!

One of the speakers of this event will be **The Very Reverend Dr. John Hall**, Dean of Westminster Abbey, who will relate how the Abbey has been in the center of Britain's history for over a thousand years, having served as the site of 16 royal weddings, the final resting place of 17 monarchs and the coronation church for every crowned monarch since 1066. This June, the Abbey was the site of the commemoration of Her Majesty's coronation in Westminster Abbey in 1953. Dr. Hall will tell the details of the Abbey's celebrations of her reign and the creation of the Queen's Diamond Jubilee Galleries in the Triforium level of the Abbey.

When we sent this information to our membership, we were amazed at the numbers of our members who responded with stories about when they were present at the Queen's coronation in 1953. Nigel and Clare **Richardson** were on the Mall. **Pam Sellman** remembers standing at the edge of the road with classmates and with flag in hand. **Margo DeVoto** viewed the event from the front of St. Paul's. **Martin Wilson** didn't see it, he heard it on the radio, but 25 years later had an important position on the Strand for that anniversary.

The Grants Committee, consisting of ESU members Nicky Nicholson, Chair, Martin Wilson and John Selvage, issued grants to the following worthy students and teachers during this past year:

- 1. Travel Study Grants
 - A. Dr. Mary Raschko Mercer University <u>\$600.00</u> for Research in England on John Wyclif and understanding the History of the English Bible.
 - B. Ashley Cobb Mercer University <u>\$1,500.00</u> travel to Fiji to broaden her knowledge of healthcare, pharmacy practice, health evolution and medicine in Suva, Fiji.
 - C. Precious Patterson Mercer University <u>\$1,100.00</u> Travel to the United Kingdom to study their differing governmental structures and policies.
- 2. Shakespeare Tavern
 - A. <u>\$1,400.00</u> for the 2 college student summer interns instead of high school students. This recommendation is from the Tavern itself.
- 3. Georgia Shakespeare at Oglethorpe
 - A. Support of two Summer Interns at <u>\$1,500.00</u> each, totaling <u>\$3,000.00</u>.

Total Amount of \$7,600.00.
