Among our New Year resolutions, I suspect that most of us included the hope that we'll have even more and better experiences in 2024. Here are a couple of Florida day trips that can help you keep that resolution.

Only a little over an hour up the turnpike in Bushnell, you can take in the Dade Battle Re-enactment on January 6th and 7th. As many of you (I hope) know, the Seminole attack on Major Francis L. Dade, a little over two months before the Battle of the Alamo, sparked the Second Seminole War, the longest, deadliest, and costliest of all Indian wars. In what was once called the Dade Massacre, about 104 U.S. soldiers died but only about six Seminoles. Miami-Dade County is named after the hapless major.

Those ESU members who have always dreamed of seeing Cuba can visit it by car and without a passport. Tampa's José Marti Park, named after the country's greatest poet and freedom fighter, is actually owned by the Cuban government and has soil from each Cuban province. Between 1961 and 2015, while the U.S. suspended diplomatic ties with our island neighbor, the park was the only Cuban owned territory in the U.S. To complete the trip, have a meal at the original Columbia Restaurant, owned and operated by the same family since 1905.

About two hours up the turnpike is Marjorie Kinnan Rawlings State Park in Cross Creek. After visiting Marjorie's home, everyone goes to The Yearling Restaurant for some fried green tomatoes, gator, or venison (even though it seems a bit strange to eat a yearling at The Yearling). And don't be discouraged by its Cracker exterior. Unfortunately, the restaurant has not found anyone to replace Willie Green, its legendary blues guitarist who died in 2021.

About an hour north of us up I-4 is DeLeon Springs State Park, home of the Old Spanish Sugar Mill Pancake House (now under new management). If you have never been there, the restaurant allows customers to cook their own pancakes on griddles built into each table. Since there is normally a long wait once you put your name in for a table, you can use that time to take a 50-minute pontoon boat ride to the Lake Woodruff National Wildlife Refuge.

Even closer to us is Blue Spring State Park. Before Global Warming changes everything, we all still have a chance to see the manatees flock to the springs whenever the weather turns very cold. Clearly manatees have a lot in common with snow birds. It is wise to go early, though, since the park often closes temporarily when its parking spaces fill.

What's the last time you visited Silver Springs for a ride in their glass bottom boats? It's still up the turnpike and I-75 North, just past the Villages. And to prepare, watch some of the classics that were filmed there, from half a dozen Tarzan movies and James Bond's *Moonraker* to *The Creature from the Black Lagoon* and TV's *Sea Hunt*.

And finally, everybody has probably visited St. Augustine, the oldest European settlement in the U.S. If you have seen the Castillo, the historic homes, and some of its quirky museums, here are a few less visited (but fascinating) sites: (1) Fort Mose, the oldest African-American settlement in North America; (2) Fort Matanzas, the site of the deadly confrontation between the Spanish and the French Huguenots in 1565; (3) Castle Ottis just north of the city (normally open only Sunday mornings); (4) Treasury Street, arguably the narrowest in the U.S.; (5) the Tiffany windows in Flagler College's dining hall, the former Ponce de Leon Hotel built by Henry Flagler; and (6) for the horticulturalists among us, the intertwined oak and palm love trees on Cordova Street.
